current projects

Benedict is currently the senior fiction writer in the MFA program in Creative Writing at Southern Illinois University Carbondale. He is also the founder and director of the <u>Digital Expressions Lab</u> at SIUC, which offers non-STEM-oriented students the opportunity to create <u>immersive narrative experiences</u>. He and his students are engaged in an AI (GPT-3) and VR (Oculus Quest) storytelling collaboration with <u>Ajit Joakar</u>, the Course Director for Artificial Intelligence: Cloud and Edge implementations at the University of Oxford, UK. Benedict is currently at work on a 360-degree stereoscopic visual novel for VR entitled *Rise & Slaughter*.

publications

Benedict has published three collections of short fiction—*Town Smokes* (Ontario Review Press, 1987), *The Wrecking Yard and Other Stories* (Nan A. Talese Books/Doubleday, 1992), and most recently *Miracle Boy and Other Stories* (Press 53, 2010) as well as a novel (*Dogs of God*, Nan A. Talese Books/Doubleday, 1994). These books have variously appeared in UK, German, French, and Catalan editions. His fifth book, *Papa Whiskey Tango*, is forthcoming in 2020 (Press 53).

His stories have appeared in, among other magazines and anthologies, *Esquire*, *Zoetrope: All-Story*, *StoryQuarterly*, *Ontario Review*, *Tin House*, *Appalachian Heritage*, the *O. Henry Award* series (twice), the *New Stories from the South: The Year's Best* series (four times), the *Pushcart Prize* series (three times), *Red Holler: Contemporary Appalachian Literature* (a 2013 volume from Sarabande for which he also wrote the introduction), *The Ecco Anthology of the Contemporary American Short Story*, and *The Oxford Book of American Short Stories* (both the 1992 edition and the twentieth-anniversary 2012 edition, a different story in each).
