COURSES DESIGNED FOR SIU

Narrative Corners of the Internet (undergraduate)

A combination creative writing workshop and cultural studies course aimed at the critical investigation of the production, manipulation, and distortion of narratives on the internet. Students achieve "digital fluency" by reading digital humanistic theory and incorporating digital elements into their short stories.

The Digital Novella (graduate)

In addition to elucidating key craft principles and a historical survey of novellas, this workshop aims to introduce students to the hybrid digital/analog work, challenging students to use digital creation methods such as Twine, Twitter, memes, geocaching, podcasting, and even software like Microsoft PowerPoint to complete their novellas.

The New-New Journalism (graduate)

A nonfiction course and workshop in longform literary journalism designed to analyze works of "New-New Journalism" (i.e. the newest generation of nonfiction writers in the tradition of Joan Didion and Tom Wolfe) for their craft elements. Students write one 10,000-word piece of researched literary journalism and pose questions about the ethics of reporting. Notable guests in Spring 2020 included *Rolling Stone* music critic Kiana Fitzgerald, *Things We Didn't Talk about When I Was a Girl* author Jeannie Vanasco, and New York Times reporter Ben Mauk.

The Novel (graduate; modified for undergraduate)

An exploration of the novel with an emphasis on the contemporary. Students read one novel every two weeks and workshop novel excerpts of their own with the understanding that they will be expected to produce at least three chapters plus a novel outline by the end of the semester. In-class writing exercises emphasizing craft elements such as structure, characterization, and plot are assigned every other week. The in-class exercises are given "mini-workshops" during which students analyze how their work in class can inform the novels they're writing outside of class.

Queering the Narrative (undergraduate)

In this workshop, students will use creative writing to investigate queerness in every sense of the term, from themes of gender and sexuality to digital subversions of analog works to narrative hybridism. Students will engage with works of all forms by LGBTQIA authors, from the printed word to the Twine game to the audio poem. The class will culminate in the completion of a digital project which constitutes a "queering" of a standard narrative, whether that be the incorporation of queer themes into an established story, the blending of two genres, or the conversion of the analog into the digital. The class will use radical texts by authors such as Audre Lorde, Leslie Feinberg, and Jos Charles to explore the page and the screen as potential portals for the expression of queer themes.

Modalities of Fiction (graduate)

A blend of a traditional short story workshop and the digital humanities, this course encourages students to read, write, and workshop short fiction which they will then "translate" into digital format. These exercises in translation are intended to help students better understand stories on a craft level and get more experimental and daring on the page. At the beginning of class, students read Matthew Salesses's *Craft in the Real World* and build a new, non-traditional workshop together.
