Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of <u>Plants (2013)</u> as a way to spark conversation and build substance into the course. In it, Kimmerer often underscores the loop between the natural world and human culture:

"Sweetgrass pickers collect properly and respectfully, for their own use and the needs of the community. They return a gift to the earth and tend to the well-being of the *wiingashk*. The braids are given as gifts, to honor, to say thank you, to heal and to strengthen. The sweetgrass is kept in motion." (27)

As CoLA celebrates its 80th anniversary, let's similarly give back and keep in motion. Let us remember the needs of our community and be grateful for what we are entrusted to do for it—to honor others for our own well-being.

Recent Accomplishments

Jean-Pierre Reed, Professor, School of Africana and Multicultural Studies, School of Anthropology, Political Science, and Sociology, recent article publication "Insurgent Subjectivity: Hope and Its Interactant Emotions in the Nicaraguan Revolution," *Theory and Society*, 52 no. 3 (2023): 387-421, examines the role of emotions during insurgent conditions by focusing on the Nicaraguan revolution, in particular the two-year period (1977–1979) leading to the overthrow of the Somoza regime. Based on a historical ethnography and a NVivo-10 content analysis, it sets out to make a case for the significance of hope as a dominant emotion during guerrilla offensives.



Masculinity in Transition analyzes shifting relationships to masculinity in canonical works of twentieth-century literature and film, as well as in twenty-first-century

media, performance, and transgender poetics. Focusing on "toxic masculinity," which has assumed new valence since 2016, K. Allison Hammer traces its roots to a complex set of ideologies embedded in the histories of settler colonialism, racial capitalism, and political fraternity. Hammer's bold book lays bare the underlying fragility of normative masculinity.

You are invited to join the virtual launch event for WGSS Coordinator and Assistant Professor K. Allison Hammer's "Masculinity in Transition" on Friday, October 20, 2023 at 11:30 am CT. *Masculinity in Transition* traces the roots of "toxic masculinity," showing that while toxic strains of masculinity are mainly associated with straight, white men, trans and queer masculinities can be implicated in these systems of power. Arguing that these malignant forms of masculinity can be displaced, K. Allison Hammer's bold rethinking lays bare the underlying fragility of normative masculinity. They will be in conversation with Christopher Breu, Professor of English at Illinois State University, where he teaches and writes on cultural and critical theory, gender and sexuality, and contemporary literature and culture, and Greta Olson, Professor of English and American Literary and Cultural Studies at the University of Giessen, Germany.
