



Note from the Dean

“Character is the architect of achievements.” —Mark Twain

The origin of the word “character” comes from ancient Greek, meaning “engraved mark” or “distinctive quality.” It implies a consequence of experience and an obvious impact on our surroundings. I’ve heard the word applied in wildly different ways: “He’s such a character.” or “Do it, you’ll build some character.” We use the term in the more general sense in writing as how an author reveals personality through traits, dialogue, action, or relationships. Whatever it is, character building is another intangible or peripheral quality of an education—something rarely “taught” as having personal value.

I contend that yet another value of a liberal arts education is how it helps shape ones character. Samuel Eliot Morison famously said that “members of the same collegiate community, in a close and constant association with each other and with their tutors” earned students “the priceless gift of character” (*Founding of Harvard College*, 1935). The Liberal Arts do precisely that. We are architects. Our courses and curricula, but also our extracurricular experiences, build character and lead to achievement.

The University Honors Program Call for Course Proposals: Fall 26–Spring 27 Due: Wednesday, November 5, 2025. Results will be announced by December 3, 2025.

Theme: Southern Illinois Legacy Builders—embracing our history and legacy as we move into the future. For the 2026–2027 year, we'd like to focus on Southern Illinois, its rich cultural history and biogeography – and use it as a springboard to imagine our future. We invite SIUC faculty to propose seminars that deepen connections with Southern Illinois:

- delve into its deep history – human and/or preceding it
- engage with historical artifacts and places – Native American Mound Builders and Geodesic Domes
- consider the mix of rural and urban, local and global – Cairo II and St. Louis
- appreciate the significance of riches like the Mississippi river and the Shawnee National Forest
- learn about the legacy of our thinkers and creators -- Buckminster Fuller, Alan Schoen, Katherine Dunham, Eugene Redmond, Elijah Lovejoy
- reflect on social movements around race, labor, and the University's own history

We especially welcome the use of archival materials held by the museum and Morris library and inclusion of local authors/artists/activists in your proposed seminar.

The University Honors Program invites SIUC faculty to propose courses for our Fall 2026-Spring 2027 UHON 351 seminars. Honors students take these UHON seminars to fulfill their University Core requirements. The goal is to introduce students to the foundations of intellectual enquiry in a comprehensive research university within the seminar-style model of collaborative learning. Seminars are dialogic. Faculty and students engage in debate and discussion grounded in texts and materials that the class is considering.

We encourage experimental and interdisciplinary approaches that integrate theory and practice, the university and the community, and foster habits of critical thinking. These foundational courses are not surveys in specific disciplines. Rather, the objective is to engage students in exploring the big questions embedded in discipline/s, approaches or methods, and to deepen and broaden their ability to untangle major problems that confront us.

In developing your course proposal, please consider: How does the course introduce students, especially non-majors, to the significance of your field or study? How does your method of analysis and research help examine how knowledge shapes our world and is shaped by it? How does your pedagogy engage students in experimenting with and communicating concepts such that they make deeper connections with each other and faculty? How does your subject help students feel some sense of control over their lives?

All SIUC faculty are encouraged to apply. You may submit individually or in pairs. Please submit your proposal using this [Course Proposal Form](#).



Suggested items include oranges, apples, bananas, baby carrots, ramen cups, and anything that students can easily eat for lunch.


